# Urinary Calculi...What Is It?...

#### A Wealth of Information

In an article titled, "Urinary Calculi in Sheep and Goats" by Susan Schoenian of the Maryland Cooperative Extension, urinary calculi or "water belly" is a common metabolic disease of male sheep and goats. The disease occurs when calculi (stones), usually comprised of phosphate salts, lodge in the urinary tract and prevent urination. Normally, phosphorus is recycled through saliva and excreted via feces in ruminants. High grain, low roughage diets decrease the formation of saliva and therefore increase the amount of phosphorus excreted in the urine. The primary cause of urinary calculi is feeding concentrate diets which are excessive in phosphorus and magnesium and/or have an imbalance of calcium and phosphorus. Lack of water and water sources that are high in minerals are also contributing factors.

### **Market Trends**

The American Boer Goat Association has embarked on providing its members a weekly service consisting of meat goat market trends from two of the largest markets in the United States.

Kid prices in Lancaster strengthened last week while prices in San Angelo were mixed. Numbers of goats offered in San Angelo increased 22% week-to-week and 28% in Lancaster. The number of goats at auction will likely continue to rise as the end of the year approaches. On average, the numbers of goats slaughtered increases 2% a week during the last 12 weeks of the year until slaughter numbers spike upwards in the last couple weeks. Increased demand during this period typically helps to strengthen prices. On average, Selection 1 kid prices increase \$2/cwt. between October and November.
