About Zahra:

Zahra Kiesler is an Alamo, California native. She participated in 4-H for 8 years in Nubian Goat raising. She really enjoyed showing her Nubians and met a lot of amazing people in the goat industry. While in college she was an officer with OSU's goat club and started up a herd of Nigerian Dwarfs for the club to show. Her sister runs an animal rescue specifically for livestock which gave her the opportunity to work with a plethora of animals including cattle, swine, sheep, and poultry over the years. She is also a certified AI tech for cattle.

She is very passionate about reproductive science and is excited to have the opportunity to pursue a Master's in animal science with a focus on reproductive physiology at the University of Missouri following her degree completion at OSU. She hopes to one day complete a Ph.D. in animal science focusing on reproductive biology. "I really enjoy working with goats, and I would like to continue doing research involving small ruminant reproduction," says Kiesler.

Her Research:

"I have been in Dr. Kutzler's lab for 1 year. I started my first project last summer and completed it this last winter," says Kiesler. "This is my second project in her lab. I took a couple of classes with Dr. Kutzler, and I really enjoyed her positive upbeat energy as well as her passion for theriogenology. Her research involving non-surgical methods of contraception in dogs and cats was very interesting to me. Dr. Kutzler's research has been groundbreaking when it comes to animal contraception and population control.

I was inspired to do this research because I have worked with multiple cleft palate/cleft lip goats within my sister's animal rescue. Many of these animals were surrendered to us from local farms and appeared to be healthy otherwise. I noticed these issues were much more prevalent than I previously thought, and I wondered why that was the case. I started looking into causations of facial deformities in goats, and everything I read made it seem like it was a very rare occurrence. I decided to see just how common facial deformities are within goats and determine if there were any leading causes that may be easily prevented such as removing certain plants or vegetation from their diets.

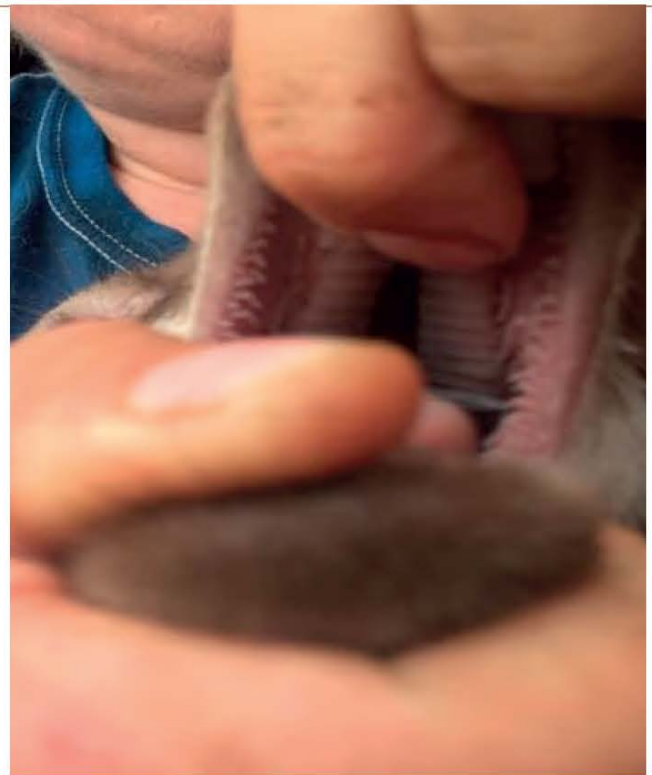
Overall, this research is looking at the prevalence of cleft palates, cleft lips and other facial deformities and possible leading causes of these defects. We collected 388 responses from 42 states. Our survey showed that 39% of respondents had at least one incident of cleft palate, cleft lip or another facial deformity at some point in time. Considering the nature of this study, it is likely the responses are biased towards an audience that has experienced some sort of craniofacial abnormality.

About a quarter of respondents that experienced a craniofacial abnormality were either positive (20%) or unsure (7%) if the dam of the affected kid was exposed to wildfire smoke or ash. Since goats are short day breeders, this coincides with the wildfire season, and we wanted to see if there was a potential relation. We asked respondents to give us information regarding birth months. It appears many of the kids whose dams were exposed to wildfire were conceived during the later months in the wildfire season with the majority being conceived in September and October. While we cannot definitively say gestational exposure to wildfire smoke causes craniofacial abnormalities, the results of this research suggest further research needs to be conducted regarding the relation of gestational exposure wildfire smoke and ash and the occurrence of cranio- facial abnormalities. Additionally, it appears genetics may also play a role in the occurrence of craniofacial abnormalities within a herd. Fifty three percent of respondents that had 2 or more goats born with a craniofacial abnormality other than a cleft palate or cleft lip stated that the goats were related. A third of producers experiencing more than one cleft palate in their herd also reported relations between the afflicted animals. We hope this initial exploration opens a new avenue for research within the small animal research."

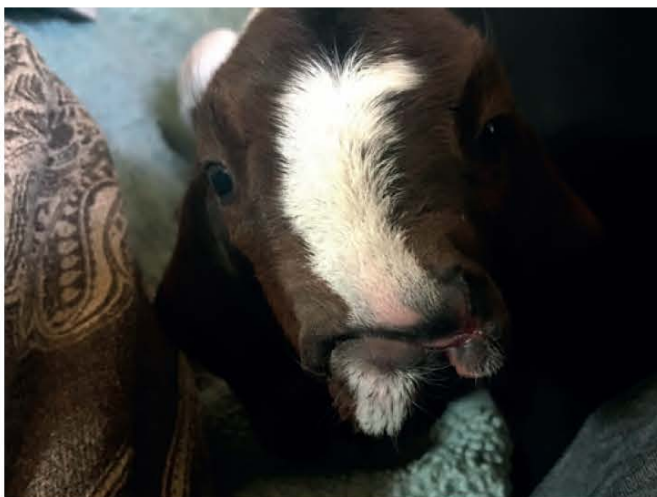

Sobre Zahra:

Zahra Kiesler es una nativa de Alamo California. Ella participo en 4H por 8 años en la cría de las Nubian cabras. Ella de verdad disfruto en demostrando sus Nubios y conoció mucha gente asombrosa en la industria de la cabra. Cuando estaba en la Universidad era una oficial con el club de OSU. Ella comenzó un rebaño de Enanas Nigerianas para que el club las demostrar. Su hermana realizo un rescate de animales específicamente para el ganado, y le dio la oportunidad de trabajar con una gran cantidad de animales incluyendo Ganado, cerdos ovejas y gallinas a lo largo de los años. Ella también es una tecnología de AI certificada para el Ganado. Esta muy apasionada de las ciencias reproductivas y emocionada de tener la oportunidad de obtener una Maestría en ciencias de animales con un enfoque en fisiología reproductiva en la Universidad de Missouri luego de completar la licenciatura en OSU. Ella espera algún día completar un doctorado en ciencias de animales enfocándose en biología reproductiva. "Realmente disfruto trabajar con cabras y me gustaría continuar investigando sobre la reproducción de pequeños rumiantes", dice Kiesler.

Su Investigación:

"He estado en el laboratorio del Dr. Kutzler durante 1 año. Comencé mi primer proyecto el verano pasado y lo terminé este último invierno", dice Kiesler. "Este es mi segundo proyecto en su laboratorio. Tomé un par de clases con la Dr. Kutzler y realmente disfruté de su energía positiva y optimista, así como de su pasión por la teriogenología. Su investigación sobre métodos anticonceptivos no quirúrgicos en perros y gatos fue muy interesante para mí. La investigación del Dr. Kutzler ha sido revolucionaria en lo que respecta a la anticoncepción de animales y el control de la población.

Me inspiré para hacer esta investigación porque he trabajado con múltiples cabras de paladar hendido / labio leporino dentro del rescate de animales de mi hermana. Muchos de estos animales nos fueron asegurados de granjas locales y, de lo contrario, parecían estar sanos. Me di cuenta de que estos problemas eran mucho más frecuentes de lo que pensaba anteriormente, y me pregunté por qué era así. Comencé a investigar las causas de las deformidades faciales en las cabras y todo lo que leo hace que parezca que fue una ocurrencia muy rara. Decidí al ver cuán comunes son las deformidades faciales dentro de las cabras y determinar si hubo alguna causa principal que pueda prevenirse fácilmente, como eliminar ciertas plantas o vegetación de sus dietas.

En general, esta investigación analiza la prevalencia de paladar hendido, labio leporino, y otras deformidades faciales y las posibles causas principales de estos defectos. Recopilamos 388 respuestas de 42 esta-

dos. Nuestra encuesta mostró que el 39% de los encuestados tuvo al menos un incidente de paladar hendido, labio leporino u otra deformidad facial en algún momento. Teniendo en cuenta la naturaleza de este estudio, es probable que las respuestas estén sesgadas hacia una audiencia que ha experimentado algún tipo de anomalía craneofacial.

Aproximadamente una cuarta parte de los encuestados que experimentaron una anomalía craneofacial fueron positivos (20%) o no estaban seguros (7%) si la cabra de la cría afectada estuvo expuesto al humo o la ceniza de los incendios forestales. Dado que las cabras son criadoras de días cortos, esto coincide con la temporada de los incendios forestales, y queríamos ver si había una relación potencial. Les pedimos a los encuestados que nos dieran información sobre los meses de nacimiento. Parece que muchas de las crías cuyas represas fueron expuestas a incendios forestales fueron concebidos durante los últimos meses de la temporada de incendios forestales y la mayoría fueron concebidos en Septiembre y Octubre. Si bien no podemos decir definitivamente que la exposición gestacional al humo de los incendios forestales cause anomalías craneofaciales, los resultados de esta investigación sugieren que es necesario realizar más investigaciones sobre la relación de la exposición gestacional al humo de los incendios forestales, las cenizas y la aparición de anomalías craneofaciales. Además, parece que la genética también puede desempeñar un papel en la aparición de anomalías craneofacial dentro de una manada. El cincuenta y tres por ciento de los encuestados que tenían 2 o más cabras nacidas con una anomalía craneofacial que no fuera el paladar hendido o el labio leporino declararon que las cabras estaban relacionadas. Un tercio de los productores que experimentan más de un paladar hendido o labio leporino declararon que las cabras estaban relacionadas. Un tercio de los productores que experimentaron más de un paladar hendido en su rebaño también informaron relaciones entre los animales afectados. Esperamos que esta exploración inicial abra una nueva vía para la investigación dentro de la investigación con animales pequeños.

Cenedella Family



As my wife and I started our family in the concrete jungle in Northern California, I knew that was not the way I wanted to raise our growing family. Having grown up on a decent amount of land and my wife in a rural city, the way of life you find in a big city just didn't feel right. So after starting a new job, we had the opportunity to purchase 20 acres and have a little more freedom the countryside has to offer.

We started like most people do, building a coop and raising chicks into chickens. But a year or so into our new adventure we were ready for more and bought 2 little Boer doelings, more as a novelty and a little for keeping the weeds down. Never did we imagine that this would be the gateway to what we have now. What started as just having a few animals to say we have them has turned into a passion.

When our oldest daughter, London, was able to start 4-H, we found the natural entry point into showmanship was with a Pygmy goat. Soon our second daughter, Sydney, also got a pygmy goat to show. Before we knew it, London was old enough to show and auction off a Market animal through 4-H and local county fair, the Yuba-Sutter Fair. Having already been familiar with Boer goats, and having experience with pygmy goats, London and we decided the best entry into market animals was for

her to get involved in market goats. But when we started researching and looking around for market goats, we came to a crossroads. Did we buy a wether (or two) each year or do we try to build up a breeding program as we knew we would likely eventually have all three kids showing market goats?

With that in mind we searched and bought a Full-blood Boer goat to breed with our two commercial does. Really not knowing what we were doing other than turn him loose and wait five months, we were blessed with a handful of kids and London picked out two bucklings to raise for her market goat project.

She worked hard and then COVID hit, derailing all her work as we were notified the local fair for 2020 was canceled. The community rallied and was able to put together an online auction for the year. London made a good amount, but the excitement of showing and being in the ring with her first market goat was taken from her. More so, listening to the critique of her goat from the judge online was heartbreaking.

All her hard work and the judge instantly immediately called out her goat as one not worth talking about and preceded on to discuss the other three in the online grouping. This was harder for me than London, who was just

happy to see her goat on the screen. I took it a bit personal and set out to put in place a better breeding program to give my kids a better opportunity.

After doing a lot of research, talking to whoever would give me the time and looking at what was considered a quality market goat, we purchased a few more market does and improved our feed schedule. While still learning, we had to move up our breeding season due to fair dates moving, and it wasn't that successful with the number of kids born was minimal. On a good note, our 4-H market goat project group was growing, but this also meant we had other 4-Hers lined up to purchase some kids from us, so London picked her one and we ran with it.

London named him Eragon, and she picked him because she loved his dappled coat. She worked hard with him and loved him. Together, London and I implemented a better feed schedule as compared to her first goat. Between that, and tweaks to London and his exercise and care routine, Eragon really began to take off and look good. At the time of fair, he was five weeks older than the previous year's project but weighed in over 45 pounds heavier. He was a strong, well-built wether and topped out at 118 pounds at fair. Our fair's range is 65-115, but the kids don't get disqualified for going over -

they simply only get paid up to 115 pounds.

While she had participated in the online auction last year, this was her first year in showmanship. But we accidentally entered her into the 4-H junior showmanship group instead of the correct, 4-H novice showmanship group. Out of the two dozen kids in this group, London and Eragon managed to score themselves a ribbon, taking 8th. This was no small feat for showing a goat 40+ pounds heavier than herself. Then came the market class. She shocked me when she took 2nd in class. Although she did not get Champion or reserve in the next round, just being in the final 8 was special.

But wait there's more. We had entered her into the Bred and Fed category. We figured, why not, let's see where we rank of those that also raise their own. As London entered the ring with the other participants, they walked a circle, lined up, braced and did a few other maneuvers for the judge. London was quickly directed to the top spot. I got a chill and turned to some friends and asked, cause I've never seen this portion of a show, if she got first or if they do more positioning. At that moment I watch the judge walk over to the podium and grab the microphone.

As soon as he uttered a simple phrase "I really appreciate this group of kids..." I had tears in my eyes. Indeed London and Eragon were in the top spot. On top of which the judge continued to say there was a clear choice for first. The pride I felt, knowing that we were able to put together a program that we are still very much growing and improving on and to be able to produce a goat that could compete and win in just two short years is more than I could have ever imagined. But by far, the best reward as a parent that day was the smile on London's face when she realized she had won the category as well.

Come auction time, which is always so hard on the kids (and to be honest the parents as well), London did a phenomenal job. She received a winning bid of \$16/lb. She worked hard, and while she shed some tears for her Eragon, she is also already looking forward to kidding season this fall so she can choose her next one.

We have added some more goats since last kidding season (because when do you really have too many goats?), focusing on Fullbloods and mixing in more dapples and traditionals to expand our offerings. We officially started our business, CnS Farm in 2020 as well. All of our kids (including our toddler, Victoria) are taking an interest in our farm and the goats. We look forward to expanding beyond the girls showing just at our yearly fair and into more of the show arena. We have plans on showing at the Best in the West show where we hope London and Sydney will continue to do well, but most of all just enjoy their time with their goats.

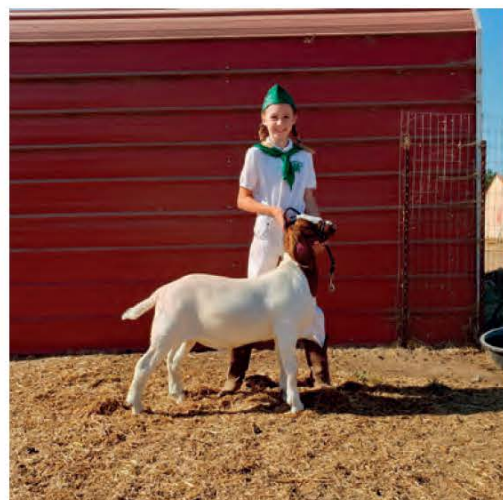
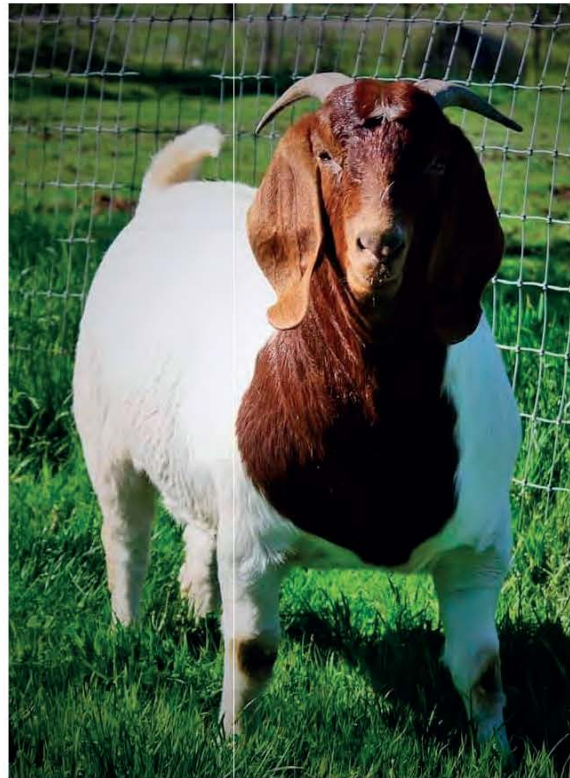

Hoof Rot - A Practical Treatment Plan

Hoof rot has many different names, regardless of what you call it, they all spell out big trouble for goats.

Hoof rot is bacteria based. And like all bacteria they thrive in wet and warm conditions. Often these conditions are caused by summer rains and temperatures. If the bacteria is present and the skin of the animal's foot is exposed to the bacteria, that is when the infection ensues. Goats with hoof rot can become so crippled that they cannot forage, retain proper body condition, breed properly or carry kids to term causing loss of pregnancy.

Hoof rot can be caused by two different bacterium. *Dichelobacter nodosus* and *Fusobacterium necrophorum*. *Dichelobacter nodosus* causes benign foot rot which is typically the less severe disease, but can still be very serious if left untreated. Virulent hoof rot, caused by the anaerobe *Fusobacterium*, is highly contagious. This infection usually involves the tissue between the digits but can easily spread to underlying hoof tissues. Often, both types of bacteria are involved. Luckily for goat owners, the bacteria can only live up to 10 days without a host. So, if you can get the rot under control and the animals moved to a fresh pasture - that will do the trick!!



Coni Ross

The 2021 ABGA National Show was dedicated to Coni Ross. Her family also set up a memorial scholarship for JABGA members. Coni was a nurse by trade and a goat lover by choice, She was a well-respected ABGA judge and a pioneer legend in the goat industry. Coni Ross Treatment Plan:

- Prepare a place to isolate the animals for at least 10 days.
- Vaccinate for hoof rot. Cattle and sheep vaccines are available, both will work. If using the cattle vaccine, give half the label dose given subcutaneously.
- Trim hooves short, and remove all pockets of dirt, even if the animals hooves must be quicked.
- Scrub feet with a stiff brush and pure chlorine. (Note: Clorox, is not pure bleach.)
- Give 10cc penicillin SQ.
- Give sulfa in water. 1 gram or 1000mg per goat. In the summer the average, non-lactating goat will drink 1.5 gallons/day minimum. After the first dose in water, reduce to 750mg.
- By day 3, if goats are still limping, treat the offending foot with Kopertox every day, until limping ceases.
- Repeat vaccinations and chlorine baths as necessary.

Beat The Heat

It doesn't matter if you live in San Francisco, California, Saint David, Maine, or anywhere in between. We all face the challenge of the summer heat. Below are some creative ideas to keep your critters cool

#1 Keep Hydrated

Just like people, animals need lots of water to stay well. In the summer you can freeze water bottles or jugs to keep the water supply cool. Or you can hang them from a high point for the goats to rub on.

Set up a sprinkler/mister or hose them down in the heat of the day.

Make sure animals have fresh water at all times. If the water supply has been contaminated, goats will be less likely to drink.

#2 Shelter

Nobody likes to be hot! Give your goats plenty of cover and shelter from the sweltering sun.

- Place pens around shade trees
- Build cover for goats to play on and hide under
- Build trenches or caves.
- Invest in a trampoline. Goats love to play and be off the ground. This is not only fun, but being off the ground surface will help keep them cool.

#3 Ventilation

When taking care of our animals we sometimes forget the simplest of nuances. We may build our goats a big fancy barn or shed, but we have to make sure that there is air flow! There is not much worse than being in a hot, humid, and stuff room while trying to stay cool.

- Fans
- Wind cutouts
- Ventilation shafts for breeze.

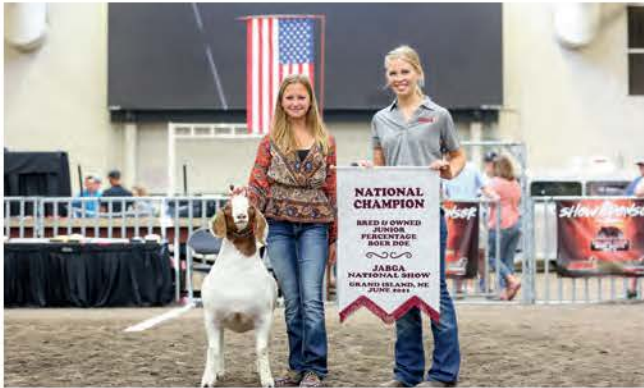

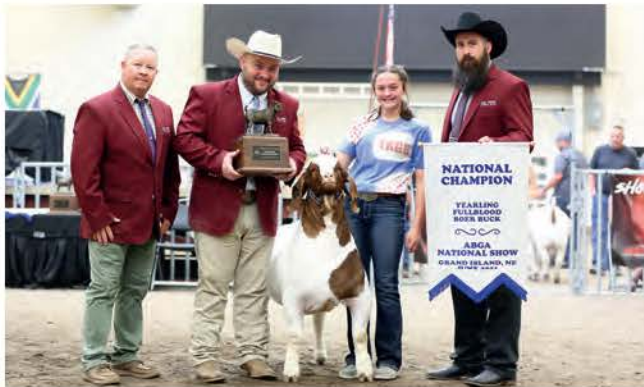

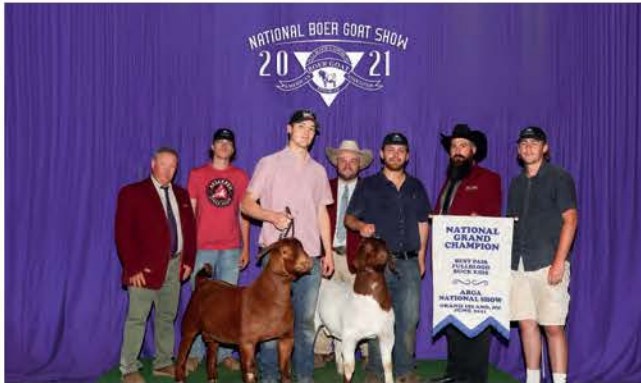

2021 AMBASSADORS TO THE BREED



Eddie Holland grew up in the small town of Bluffton, Texas. His parents owned and operated the Bluffton General Store where his Dad was postmaster. His biggest childhood influence was Mr. Ben Behrens.

When Eddie was old enough for Ag Ed, he soon became involved with livestock judging. Eddie became the first Llano High School graduate to judge livestock at Texas Tech University where he earned his Bachelor Degree in Animal Science and Master Degree in Agriculture Education.

Eddie married Peggy Hudgins Holland on June 18, 1971, and will celebrate their 50th Anniversary this year. Their daughter Kimberly, along with husband Eric, and children Kristopher and Kiersten live in Georgetown, Texas.

He worked for the Texas Cooperative Extension for 31 years, retiring as County Extension Agent in Kerr County. He spent many years coaching livestock judging teams, earning many state and national titles. Eddie also coached 4 state Champion Mohair judging teams and 4 National Wool Judging champions. He has judged cattle, swine, sheep, and goats at major livestock shows and state fairs throughout the United States, Canada, and Australia.

In 1998, Eddie traveled to South Africa, along with Bob Duke and Ferral Davis. They spent 10 days touring the farms and ranches of the top South African breeders, searching for the top stud bucks and donor does. Those animals were mated and surgically flushed, resulting in frozen embryos that were then imported into the United States. Those offspring were split between Eddie and Lone Star Boer Goats.

Eddie has served twice on the ABGA Judges Certification team. He has judged the ABGA National Show in 2007, 2010, 2013, and 2016.

Joetta Boyd and her husband, "No Goats" Shelton, first heard about the "new" goat in October 1993. Frank Craddock directed her to Norman Kohls and Don Smith in Jan 1994. They purchased a recipient carrying twins from Norman that had originally come from New Zealand. Later that spring, they joined a group that bought embryos from Landcorp in New Zealand. That was also the first year Joetta went to her first ABGA convention. She attended her first National Show in 1995 with only 1 goat. Joetta had great support from many people that taught her so much about this new adventure.

Since the beginning, she has been an active member and is always willing to lend a hand to anyone that needs or wants her help. She hauls her grandchildren and "adopted kids" across the country to do what they all love.... Showing GOATS! And "NO MORE GOATS" Shelton continues to support them from the ranch in all that they do. Joetta is also an ABGA judge and enjoys traveling and meeting all the people along the way.

"I am very humbled and honored. I can think of so many others that deserve this more than me. I have had such great support and teaching from so many across the country and would not still be here without them. Even though I have been in the goat industry for the past 27 years, there is not a day that I do not learn something new! I love this industry. I believe in teaching our kids about this industry. I enjoy meeting, helping, teaching, and learning from all of you! Thank you!"



Terry Brown first started raising goats around 1973 upon discovering that her son was sensitive to cow's milk but could drink goat's milk. She started with a few different kinds of dairy goats, delved into pygmy goats for a little while, and eventually had some cross bred Boer goats in 1995.

Upon discovering the Boer breed and how much she liked that type of goat, she decided to invest in some registered stock in 1996. Terry went to Canada to purchase full blood stock that were imported to the country as embryos from South Africa. After heading home with her new Boers that carried the Magnum herd name, she bred her own herd up to at least 100 full blooded does.

The ABGA show ring has always been one of Terry's favorite aspects of the association and the Boer goat breed. Arguably, one of her biggest accomplishments was breeding the 2017 National Champion Fullblood doe, Capriole's Precariously Pompous. But maybe an even bigger accomplishment was also breeding Pompous's sire, dam, and several generations behind each.

It is no secret that Terry's breeding program was one of a kind in the United States. Anyone who visited her ranch was immediately impressed by the large herd of extremely consistent and hardy brood does. Capriole Goat Ranch has made an everlasting impact on the Boer breed, not only for the uniqueness and quality of animal that was produced, but also for the type of person Terry is.

For as long as she has been raising goats, and even today when she has sold almost all of them, she never hesitates to lend a helping hand and to educate new breeders. Terry embodies the idea of ambassador to the breed, not only in the quality of goats she has left within the industry, but for the huge number of new breeders that she has helped foster and to thrive and grow.

After decades of raising goats, I bought my first Boer goat buck, the only Grand Champion of the North American continent in August 1993, Krugerrand. After several successful ET flushes, gaining knowledge of the protocol required to import more I boarded a plane to New Zealand and was picked up by Garrick Batten, the creator of Kiko goats, who hauled me all over the North and South Island introducing me to many iconic agricultural individuals including a visit to African Goat flock. I purchased goats from all of them and started the importation process.

Next the South African and Australia breeding company representative, Johnny Henderson came to my ranch and invited me to come over and do a speech at the grand opening of their new genetic lab. I accepted and headed for South Africa. Philip Henderson's family took me in, and we traveled together, to shows ranches, meeting all the goat producers they knew or were members of the South African Boer Goat Society. I joined them, purchased goats from them, attended and passed their educational / judges' courses, followed their protocols, did business with most of them, imported South African Boer goats to the United States, sharing acquired knowledge and genetics.

After approximately 9 years, I had become the first and only inspected South African stud flock #1003 in North America. My desire to promote the Boer goat by assistance from all whom requested by judging, forming friendships, showing, education, and donations. I came to the conclusion in a few historical words: recognizing the camaraderie and friendships that were created between producers of the only breed of livestock to make such a large impact to the agricultural industry since the British breeds of cattle came to North America should make all Boer Goat producers worldwide proud to be a part of the historical meat goat industry!



Carol DeLobbe and her family moved to the Texas Hill Country and bought a small farm in the area. Knowing that their new home was a thriving area for goats and sheep they started their journey with Spanish/Nubian goats. Sam Castleberry, a veterinary friend who had done embryo work on their cattle in the past, was flying to Japan to collect embryos from Wagyu cattle for the US market and had stopovers in New Zealand. He told them about Boer goats—very large, meaty goats he had seen there in quarantine, and that they would soon come to the U.S. In 1993, they invested in 20 frozen embryos through Mary Powis at \$500. Out of those they got ONE live kid the following spring, a buck they named Bon Joli Cyrano. Carol was widely known for her love of colored Boers and work many long years to produce and spread many notable bloodlines.

We lived on the farm for 27 years, and it has been a very good life. The goats were a joy, and they paid for themselves and for Phil's college education. He went to OU, met a wonderful girl there, graduated in 2013, got married and bought a house in Oklahoma, and it was clear they weren't coming home to the farm. In 2019 we sold the farm and the few animals we had left and moved to a nice retirement village in Oklahoma City. The kids are going to present us with a grandson on or about June 17, which is why I am not in attendance at this ceremony tonight!

In the early 1990s, we were raising Spanish goats and small hoof stock exotics. We were selling them through several exotic auctions, and the buzz on the street was all about this 300-pound goat from South Africa that was soon coming to the United States and Texas. In May of 1994, we attended the First Annual Boer Goat Convention of the newly formed ABGA in San Antonio, Texas, and we quickly knew this was going to be big! By the fall of 1994, we had purchased some of our first Boer Goats in Lampasas, Texas, and by the Spring of 1995, the first embryo kids were born at Menger Creek Ranch. During the early years, I gave many presentations on the Boer goat at goat sales in Medina, Uvalde and Lampasas in Texas to help educate new breeders on the viability and marketability of this new livestock industry. Keep in mind, at that time goats were thought of only as weed eaters but not the importance of their place in feeding the world.

Today, Menger Creek Ranch runs around 200 head of Registered Boer goats and still utilizes embryo transfer and A/I to accelerate the genetics in their herd and has also been fortunate to have raised several National Champions. One of the biggest honors of my life was to serve on the Board of Directors from 2010 through 2013 and serve as President in 2013 overseeing the inclusion of the IBGA and the passing of the ABGA Headquarters that we enjoy today. We still remain active promoting the breed, and our biggest pleasure is helping the youth with their annual goat projects.

I am humbled to be nominated for the Ambassador to The Breed and stand alongside those who have been nominated in the past and those who founded this great organization.

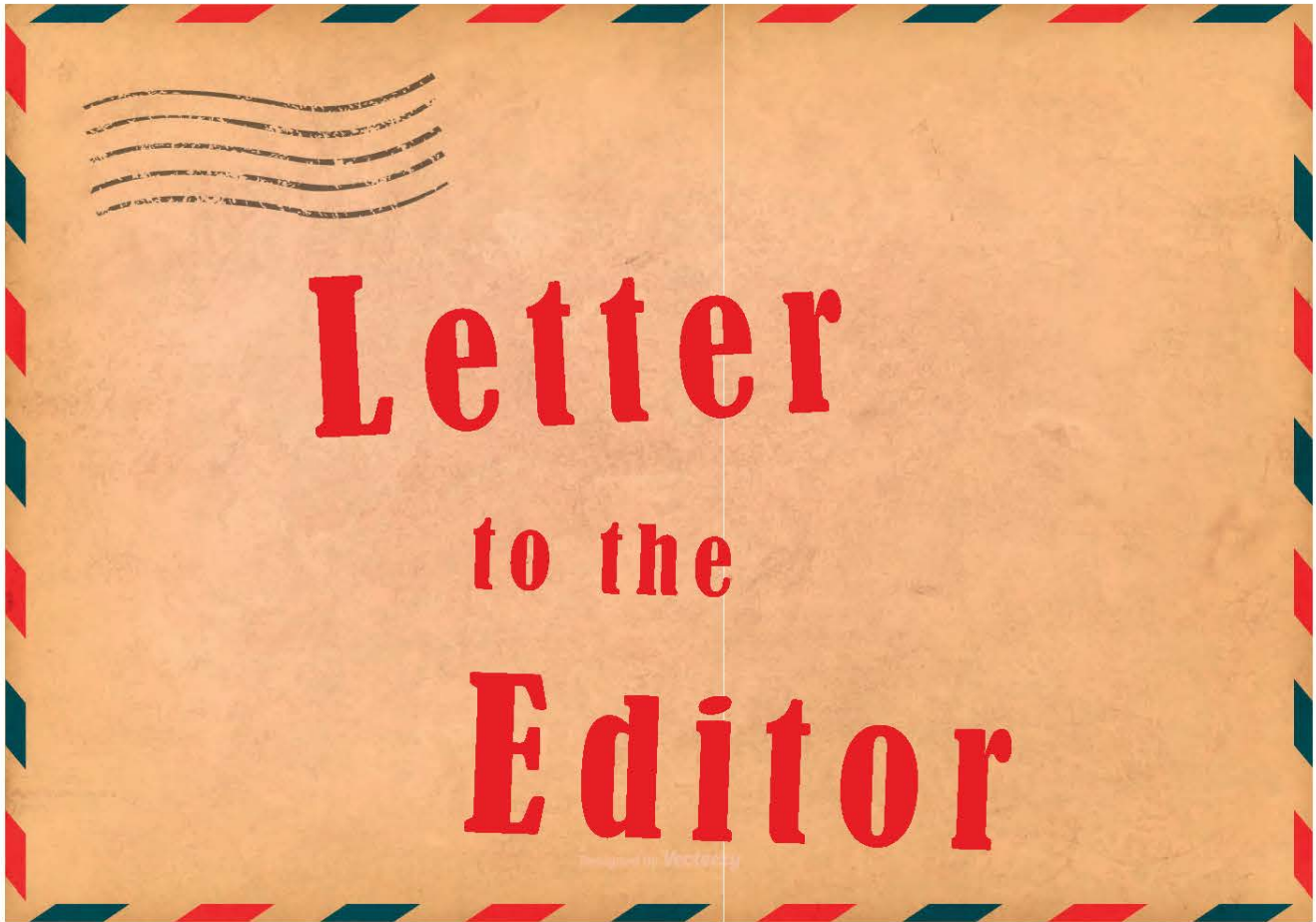
